The Bloomfield Courthouse Square — the centerpiece of the historic Davis County experience — was constructed between 1850 and 1913. The Bloomfield Main Street Office is located at 101 E. Franklin St. one block west of Hwy. 63 on the southwest corner of the Square.

Historic Bloomfield

Bloomfield was platted on April 29, 1844 and incorporated with a population of 300 in 1852. Bloomfield retains significant examples of historic architecture in both its commercial buildings and homes. The Bloomfield Square Historic District is comprised of 41 commercial buildings and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1976.



To continue your historic Davis County experience, please pick up a Historic Bloomfield Driving Tour brochure at Bloomfield Main Street or the Iowa Welcome Center, located at 301 N. Washington St. (Hwy. 63), three blocks north of the square. The driving tour begins at that location and highlights the homes, landmarks and museums located in the Davis County community.



1. National Bank of Bloomfield / Main Street Office
101 E. Franklin - Historic 1899
Bank with ornate tin ceiling and arched brick corner entry with pediment.



2. Mesker Brothers Group 103-112 E. Franklin & 202 S. Madison - Unique group of "Meskers" mail order metal facades constructed in the late 1800s.



3. Duckworth Bakery
111 S. Washington
Great preserved example of
vernacular architecture. Arches,
cast columns, decorative
corbelling and gothic style
windows.



4. The Iowa Theatre 107 S. Washington- Distinctive early 1900's theater that is still in operation. Features Art Deco Carrara glass façade and neon marquee.



5. The Exchange Bank / IOOF Lodge 113-114 E. Jefferson - The only surviving three story structures on the square. The original home of the Odd Fellows and first Rebekah Lodge in the world.



6. North side "Mesker" / Studebaker Buggy 105-6 E. Jefferson & 105 S. Madison - Ornate Mesker Bros. facade and Buggy factory building with impressive brick corbelling.



7. Taylor's Opera House 101-111 S. Madison -Restored 1874 Victorian era entertainment venue boasting arched storefront windows and original tin ceilings.
